



















Guide for E-bikes & Mobility Devices

Important Information					
Power Off		Electric mobility devices must be powered off in the terminals and onboard vessels.			
E-mobility device charging		Charging of electric mobility devices is prohibited in the terminals and onboard vessels.			
Gasoline Engines		Anything with a gasoline motor is prohibited inside the terminals or onboard vessels.			
Type		Description	Max Weight Allowed	How Fast Does it Go?	Can I Bring it on the Ferry?
E-Bike Class 1		Pedal-assist only. No throttle.	50 lbs	20 mph	
E-Bike Class 2		Pedal assist & throttle.	50 lbs	20 mph	
E-Bike Class 3		Pedal assist only. Typically no throttle.	50 lbs	28 mph	
E-Stand-up Kick Scooter		Handlebars, floorboard. Powered by motor or human power.	50 lbs	Various	
E-Bike Cargo Style over 84 inches (7 ft.)		Similar to Class I - III E-Bikes, with a cargo carrier on the back or front.			
E-Motor Scooters		Two-wheeled. Has a seat. Powered by a motor. No pedals.			
E-Mopeds		Two-wheeled, motor powered. Has pegs or pedals, with a similar look to a gas powered moped. More than 1000W or 1.3 hp.			
E-Motorcycles/ E-Dirtbikes		Two-wheeled, motor powered. Has pegs, with a similar look to gas powered motorcycle or dirtbike.
